ADULT FORUM

Adult Forum will resume Sunday, September 8, 2019. Classes are held in the fellowship hall between services, at 9:15 to 10:15. In September we will hear from two members of the Saint Louis University Faculty.

September 8 - Into the World of the New Testament: From Qumran to Corinth

How do ancient literature and archaeological discoveries help us better understand the New Testament? From the Dead Sea Scrolls, to the ruins of ancient Corinth, to the writings of Flavius Josephus, we'll look at how various texts and contexts can enhance our reading of familiar biblical texts. This forum will be led by Daniel Smith, Associate Professor of Theology at Saint Louis University.

September 15 & 22 - Changes in the American Religious Landscape

These two forums will examine major shifts in the American religious landscape since the 1950s - the decline of mainline denominations, the apparent rise of evangelicals, the political activism of the religious right, and the rise of the so-called "nones," those maintaining few beliefs and affiliations. What has precipitated these shifts and what has their impact been? Are these trends likely to continue? This forum will also examine disagreements between sociologists of religion over how to interpret these trends. This forum will be led by Mark Edward Ruff, Professor of History at Saint Louis University.

September 29 - Following Israel into the Wilderness: Ancestry, Ethnicity, and Imagination

The Israelites who departed Egypt and entered the wilderness have left a checkered legacy. This "crooked and perverse generation" is remembered as a generation that rebelled and died in the wilderness. But Paul tells a much more complex story in 1 Corinthians 10 about "our ancestors" who were "baptized into Moses" and who walked with Christ in the desert. What is he talking about? We'll hope to unpack Paul's peculiar words to the Corinthians, to ponder his ideas about ethnicity, and to explore the implications for American Christians today. This forum will be led by Daniel Smith, Associate Professor of Theology at Saint Louis University.

Call Committee Update

This month the church council took action to approve the Ministry Site Profile (a detailed description of our congregation and ministries here) that was developed over the past year by the transition team. The council also appointed six people to the call committee. The bishop's office appointed Rev. BJ Arnold to be our call process minister. She will work with the congregation to make sure that the call process proceeds in accordance with the congregation's constitution and Central States Synod policies. The council and call committee met jointly so Rev. Arnold could explain the call process in detail:

- The call committee will upload the Ministry Site Profile for the bishop's approval.
- At that time our vacancy announcement will go "live" to the church at large.
- Ordained clergy who are interested in our congregation would contact our bishop's office, who will select candidates who appear suitable for ministry here at CLC.
- If a member or members of Christ wish to recommend a particular person for consideration, there will be a way to do that.
- Recommended candidates would be contacted by the bishop to see if they are interested.
- When the bishop's office is satisfied, they will forward a group of names and application material to the call committee for initial consideration and interviews.
- Following the first interviews the committee will either select a candidate for further consideration or request additional names.
- When the call committee selects a finalist the congregation will meet the person and family (if any) and the pastor would get to meet us.

There are additional steps, but this summarizes the process. Ultimately there will be a congregation meeting with two votes: one would extend a call to the pastor, and the second vote would be to approve the compensation package. The meeting and vote tallies will be monitored by the call process minister and reported to the bishop's office.

This seems like a complex process, but it works to protect the congregation and prospective pastors by creating safeguards and checkpoints along the way. The names of pastors under consideration by the call committee and the interview process must (by policy) remain confidential. The committee will, however, keep the congregation apprised of its progress.

As soon as the Ministry Site Profile is online and approved, a copy will be available to members along with a method to recommend people for consideration.

Members of the call committee are Katie Ciorba, Kate Dopuch, Jesse Helton, Dave Ringkor, Flo Saeger, and Jon Heerboth, Chair.

Confirmation Preparation Classes

Confirmation classes for 7th and 8th graders from the partner churches of the Southside Cluster (Christ Lutheran, St. Mark's, St Thomas Holy Spirit and Trinity Kirkwood) will begin on Sunday, September 22 at 12:30 pm at St. Thomas Holy Spirit, 3980 S. Lindbergh Blvd, Sappington. The classes will study the 10 Commandments for the first half of the coming year. Classes will occur every two weeks, so please mark the following dates on your calendar: Sept. 22, Oct. 6, Oct. 20, Nov. 3, Nov. 17, Dec.1, Dec. 15.

Snacks will be available and the class will conclude at 1:30 pm. It is hoped that moving the class time up in the afternoon will make it more possible for people to attend worship at each church and then be able to get to confirmation class more easily.



Sanctuary Denomination

On August 7, 2019, this story appeared in national news: The 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly meeting in Milwaukee, voted to approve a memorial that declares the ELCA a sanctuary church. The ELCA is the first North American denomination to declare itself a sanctuary church body. As a sanctuary church the ELCA is committed to **serving and supporting migrant children and families in communities across the country.**

In its simplest form, becoming a sanctuary denomination means that the ELCA is publicly declaring that walking alongside immigrants and refugees is a matter of faith. In baptism, we are brought into a covenantal relationship with Jesus Christ that commits us to strive for justice and peace in all the earth. Following the example of Martin Luther, we believe that advocacy is a crucial expression of baptismal identity. As a church, we have advocated for stopping the detention of children and families for decades. We have spoken out against family separation, sought a pathway to citizenship for community members who have lived in the U.S. for many years, and have taken steps to address the root causes of migration in a way that honors the humanity in people who must flee.

Through the ELCA's AMMPARO strategy, we continue this work. Talking points, articles, videos and resources are housed here (https://download.elca.org/ELCA%20Resource%20Repository/ELCA_SanctuaryDenomination_TalkingPoints.pdf?_ga=2.243256523.870673896.1566327078-1739451863.1565651104) so this church can have conversations about what sanctuary means with many of our members in their context to discern future action and direction. Becoming a sanctuary denomination was voted on and passed by the 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly in Milwaukee.

Being a sanctuary denomination means that we, as church together, want to be public and vocal about this work. It will look different for everyone, but welcoming people is not a political issue for us – it is a matter of faith. (From elca.org)
