# PASTOR'S WORD

Christ Lutheran family, Advent blessings as our journey continues. Stories of memories of Christmases past that you have shared show the breadth of experience that this season can bring. There is hope, we know—God is with us, we know! And, this year especially, there is grief, and frustration, and pain as we observe and experience the losses and brokenness of the world around us, and even in our own households. There is light at the end of the tunnel, but we are still in the dark.

As the days shorten and the nights lengthen, I am reminded of activist Valerie Kaur's claim at the Poor People's Campaign in 2017 that darkness is not the absence of God, and the absence of hope, but has gifts of its own: "What if," she asks, "this darkness is not the darkness of the tomb? But the darkness of the womb? ... What does a midwife tell us to do? Breathe. And then push. Because if we don't push we will die. If we don't push our nation will die. Tonight we will breathe. Tomorrow we will labor." If you are feeling the weight of the world today, or the weight of your own grief or pain, I offer you a Blessing by Jan Richardson to travel with. Peace to you in the joys and hopes and sorrows and pain of this season!

## A Blessing for Traveling in the Dark (by Jan Richardson)

Go slow if you can. Slower. More slowly still.

Friendly dark or fearsome, this is no place to break your neck
by rushing, by running, by crashing into what you cannot see.
Then again, it is true: different darks have different tasks,
and if you have arrived here unawares,
if you have come in peril or in pain,
this might be no place you should dawdle.
I do not know what these shadows ask of you,
what they might hold that means you good or ill.
It is not for me to reckon whether you should linger or you should leave.
But this is what I can ask for you:
That in the darkness there be a blessing.
That in the shadows there be a welcome.
That in the night you be encompassed
by the Love that knows your name.

# Following Mary and Joseph's Journey of Hope



### Matthew 1:18-24

<sup>18</sup> This is how the birth of Jesus the Messiah came about d: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be pregnant through the Holy Spirit. <sup>19</sup> Because Joseph her husband was faithful to the law, and yet did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly.

<sup>20</sup> But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. <sup>21</sup> She will give birth to a son, and you are to give

him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins."

<sup>22</sup> All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: <sup>23</sup> "The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" (which means "God with us").

<sup>24</sup> When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife.

#### **Advent Journal Reflection**

Joseph had decided to divorce Mary quietly, because he believed he couldn't marry her when she was already pregnant. Then, Joseph had a dream in which God tells him he should stay with her. **Reflect on this in the red Advent Journal**.....

Have you ever been sure of what to do about a hard situation, and then felt led by God to change your mind?

Have you ever made a decision that you felt God calling you to, but you knew other people would think was wrong, and would judge you for?

### Children's Activity

In the red Advent Journal, draw a picture of the angel coming to Joseph while he was sleeping, to tell him that Mary's baby was Jesus. Do you think he was surprised? Afraid? Happy?

Take home a coloring sheet to color later!

# With your holiday donations:

- We were able to adopt a local family of five through Webster-Rock Hill Ministries. The mother and her four children will all receive multiple gift cards from Target, Wal-mart, Old Navy, and Kohl's. ### **ADULT FORUM**

Stand Your Ground: Black Bodies and the Justice of God is a book written by the Rev. Kelly Brown Douglas in response to the 2012 killing of Trayvon Martin. Several members of CLC read the book, met regularly to discuss it, then shared their impressions at Adult Forum. Sarah Keifer, Kate Hoerchler, Katie Ciorba, Mark and Jan Roock along with Pastor Meagan told us what they learned and how they were changed by their reading.

Writing as a mother of a Black son, Douglas examines the long history of white exceptionalism that has resulted in the



devaluation of the bodies of Black people. In fact, they are deprived of the right to move freely. Since they are often perceived as dangerous, white people have reacted violently, on occasion ending the lives of black people who offered no threat.

When people came from Africa, Douglas says, they brought God with them—an idea that God makes them free. They heard the Biblical story of Moses leading people out of Egypt as universal: God frees everybody.

Douglas argues the pervasive atmosphere of White exceptionalism is the major obstacle to justice for Black Americans. A necessary step for Blacks to realize their God-given freedom is for White Americans to confront attitudes and actions that limit the space Black people inhabit. In other words, the onus is on us.

John Hoffmann offered the analogy of White privilege as a backpack that White people carry around and, through awareness, can remove. Katie Ciorba expanded on that idea and pointed out how easy it is to pick up that backpack of privilege after we thought we had shed it. That is, removing the attitudes of White supremacy is an on-going process. Alena Horn, speaking from the perspective as a linguist, made two points:

- (1) Standard language is one of the ways in which white supremacy is manifested. The standard language variety (used in government, professional and education settings) is not superior to non-standard varieties, but is perceived to be so because it is the variety used by people in power.
- (2) Poetic traditions that use non-standard language varieties should be taught as part of our literary canon.

The group offered several books for further reading: Waking Up White And Finding Myself in the Story of Race by Debby Irving and two by Isabel Wilkerson, The Warmth of Other Suns and her latest, Caste.

Sarah Keifer announced that the next book is *Me and White Supremacy: Combat Racism, Change the World, and Become a Good Ancestor* by Layla Saad. Sarah recommends buying it from a local bookstore.

A discussion of the film "Blackkklansman" will be Thursday Dec. 10 at 8:00 on Zoom. A recording of this Adult Forum discussion is in the Church's Dropbox.
