

As we strive to live into our call to Welcome and Serve, this is a very important time of discernment for our congregation. You should have received our White Paper with all the details about this conversation in the mail and e-mail, the Q&A summary is provided below.

Mead Center Potential Sale Q&A

Who are the potential buyers, anyways?

The identity of the potential buyer will be shared with the congregation when we have a detailed official offer to share. We can say that we are excited about the possibility for community relationship and partnership with either of the potential buyers.

If we sell the Mead Center, where will we have Worship while the renovation is happening? That will depend on the phase of the renovation. This is a challenge inherent in the renovation process itself, and with flexibility and good communication we know we have options that will allow us to have Worship every Sunday throughout the process.

There will be times during the renovation when we will be able to use the majority of the sanctuary space, and can hold Worship there.

We will seek to negotiate with the potential buyer to use the Mead Center on Sundays when needed.

We can Worship in the church yard when the weather allows.

We always have the option to have Worship fully on Zoom on the Sundays when neither the sanctuary nor Mead Center are an option . . . and we hope those weeks will be minimal.

If we sell the Mead Center, where will we have Sunday School?

Before and during renovation, we will negotiate with the potential buyer to use the Mead Center classrooms on Sundays so Sunday School can happen in the current classrooms. We also have space in the office building—including the Conference Room and unused office space—that, while not ideal and not a long-term solution, will serve the needs of the Sunday School during the renovation period.

After renovation, we know from conversations with our architects that we can create the Sunday School classroom and gathering space we need within the 1 Selma church building. The Renovation Team and architects are working on specific plans to best meet these needs, and we will provide details about the plans when they are ready to be shared, BEFORE the congregation is asked to approve and commit to a sales contract with a specific buyer.

Doesn't this mean we will have a much more expensive renovation to 1 Selma?

Yes, it does. We do not have numbers for this yet, but will secure and provide an estimate BEFORE the congregation is asked to approve and commit to a sales contract with a specific buyer.

Although the renovation will be more expensive, the increased expense will be 100% covered by the proceeds from the sale of the Mead Center. It is also expected that a meaningful portion of the sale proceeds would be available to fund a portion of the originally planned renovation. We also know we have access to a loan with good terms through the Mission Investment Fund to help fund the project while contributions come in for the Capital Campaign.

Can't we wait until after the renovation before selling the Mead Center? We certainly can.

The advantage to waiting is that we would have total use of the Mead Center during the renovation.

The disadvantages to waiting are:

- We would be passing up an offer to purchase the Mead Center that has come to us with no effort on our part.
- We would need to carry a significantly higher debt load for the renovation itself, with no guarantee that we
 would be able to sell the Mead Center in a timely manner at a favorable price when the renovation is complete.
- We would continue to carry the burden of financial obligations for necessary maintenance and renovation at the Mead Center with no income from a regular tenant.
- We would continue to carry the burdens of significant staff and volunteer time necessary to maintain the Mead Center, and continue struggling to "keep up" with the necessary tasks.

This feels fast! Why the rush?

There are two main reasons for the timing of the Council's invitation to consider selling Mead Center.

- 1. We were notified July 27 that L'Arche, our primary tenant and source of income from the Mead Center, has purchased a new building for themselves and will be vacating Mead Center and moving to that building November 1. This leaves us with minimal or no income from the Mead Center.
- 2. Without effort on our part, we have had two parties express interest in considering purchase of the Mead Center, and one of those parties has said they want to give us a formal offer on the Mead Center. We believe the second party remains interested.

While it does feel fast, the Council believes this is something the congregation should be informed about and invited to make a decision on.

We, your Council, commit to the following:

- We will provide you with all of the information you need to make a well-informed decision.
- We know the potential buyers have their process to go through which will take some time for them, so we do not expect pressure from them to make a decision before we are ready. If the potential buyer were to require an answer more quickly than the congregation is ready to provide one, which we believe would be unlikely, we will allow the opportunity to pass.

We ask you, the congregation, to commit to the following:


- Share how you are feeling about this possibility. The Mead Center has been an important part of the
 community life, and many of you have invested time and hopes in the building and its possibilities. There are
 many emotions within the council about the idea of selling the Mead Center, and we know there are in the
 congregation as well.
- Engage in the process. Read the information, attend forums when you can, and talk with your Council members. We can't make a good decision as a congregation without you!
- Ask your questions. If there is anything you need to know, please ask, and if we don't know the answer, we will
 do the work to find out.

If we sell Mead Center, what will the renovation look like?

The renovation team will be starting with plans already approved by the congregation, and the concerns expressed about accessibility of the approved renovations, and build from there. The renovation team is already preparing to move this process forward so we will be able to provide more information before a contract with a specific buyer is approved. There is much yet to be decided, but here is what we know.

- The elevator will access all levels, including the choir loft and fellowship hall, and will be big enough to accommodate wheelchairs and coffins.
- The choir loft will be expanded, as has been requested by the choir.
- We will have space for Sunday School classrooms and Sunday School gathering space that is separate from the Forum/fellowship space. This new space would be an integral part of the Church building, eliminating potentially unsafe crossing of our parking lot by our children to reach current classrooms at #17 Selma.
- We will likely lose a small amount of parking space to accommodate a more comprehensive renovation architects will work to minimize that loss.



Friends of IISTL,

Let us first say thank you for your outpouring of volunteer interest, financial contributions and general concern for the current situation unfolding in Afghanistan these past couple weeks. While there continues to be community support, there are many other ways you can be involved and support those who most need it.

You might ask yourself, what can I do to help?

- 1) Donate to frontline organizations here in St. Louis.
- International Institute of St. Louis serving populations from all around the world in the St. Louis area since 1919. As the only refugee resettlement agency in the St. Louis region, IISTL on average serves 7,500 individuals on an annual basis. With deep cuts to the refugee resettlement program over the past several years, IISTL is working on building capacity in order to serve those who come to St. Louis and are in the most need. You can help by sharing current job openings. Not able to donate monetarily? Organize a donation drive for some of our most needed items. Or host a fundraising event or donation drive.
- Oasis International Ministries (314-535-3800) & House of Goods Baitulman (314-833-3300) both serve
 critical roles in providing goods and services to newly arrived refugees. Along with monetary donations,
 they both accept and distribute donated furniture and household items to refugees to start their new lives
 here in St. Louis. IISTL utilizes help from both organizations regularly.
- 2) Donate to organizations working in Afghanistan and surrounding areas to help.
- <u>International Rescue Committee (IRC)</u> assisting on the ground in refugee camps as well as helping individuals and families resettle in the U.S.
- <u>Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service (LIRS)</u> active in refugee resettlement across the U.S. Currently, LIRS is operating their program "Afghan Allies" lending assistance to those currently in Afghanistan.
- <u>United Nations Refugee Agency (UNHCR)</u> providing on-the-ground support for those displaced and in need in Afghanistan.
- <u>U.S. Committee for Refugees & Immigrants (USCRI)</u> currently providing resources and information to those in Afghanistan and around the world on SIV applications and beyond.
- 3) Donate to specialized service organizations here in St. Louis. We're so fortunate to live in such a diverse city where foreign-born community support organizations are plentiful. It's not just about newly arrived refugees. These organizations serve the wider immigrant populations in our region.
- Casa de Salud
- Welcome Neighbor STL
- Bilingual International Assistant Services (BIAS)
- MICA Project
- Immigrant Home English Learning Program (IHELP)
- 4) Prepare to volunteer your time and energy.
- We know that we at IISTL are anticipating 1,000 refugee cases this year. We don't know when they will come sometimes we will receive as little as 24-48 hours' notice of arrival. IISTL, as well as the above-mentioned organizations, will need your help. The best things you can do right now is to prepare fill out interest forms and applications, stay engaged and informed. We're sure other organizations will form and become more involved. New needs will formulate. Be patient and flexible with the ever-changing landscape that is refugee resettlement.
- 5) Advocate on any and all levels.
- Pick up the phone. Call your representatives (local, state, federal) and let them know that you want action
 from them now and on an ongoing basis around the issue of Afghan resettlement. Policy makers as well
 as shapers of public discourse need to understand that there is broad bipartisan consensus for Afghan
 resettlement and that regardless of opinions on the military engagement the United States should not
 abandon its allies to be persecuted.

While timelines are currently unknown, what we do know is that your help will be needed. Get involved today and stay involved. This is a tragedy we're watching unfold in real-time. We're unfortunately seeing these types of situations happen more and more on the global stage. We can help. Let them come. Let us welcome our new neighbors with open arms.
