November 28 No adult Forum—Thanksgiving weekend

Summary of *November 7* Adult Forum **Stasis and the State**.

Alena and Kersten Horn led us through an examination of the decline in religious practice that has occurred in Europe and now appears to be happening in the United States. The primary cause is modernization. Informed by the Enlightenment and following the changes that accompanied the Industrial Revolution, the role of religion in western society faced major changes throughout the 19th and 20th centuries with the literal interpretation of the Bible being challenged by Darwin and German theological thinkers, the creation of secular spaces for specialized areas like science and technology, increasing urbanization and the state assuming roles (education, medical care, social welfare) that had been previously carried out by the church.

But Government policy can play a role in how religion survives. Alena told of two such incidents that led to the decline of religious practice. In the Czech Republic the White Mountain Massacre of Protestants in 1620 is a lasting memory. And in France the Church did not respond to the needs of the people before the revolution of 1789 and continued to be unresponsive into the nineteenth century when it aligned with the monarchists. Now both the Czech Republic and France are two of the most secular countries in Europe.

Kersten then gave two instances of the opposite: One was the alliance between the Polish Catholic Church and Solidarity, a Union of port workers that developed into a national movement. Together, when the Iron Curtain fell in the late 1980's, they worked to replace the Communist Government of Poland with a democratic state. Today Poland is one the most observant nations.

An example of Church and State working together occurred when ethnic Germans who had lived in Russia for several generations returned to Germany and were welcomed.

In Germany about 60% of the population is either Catholic or Protestant though church attendance is low. Kersten noted differences between the relationship of the German State and the Church compared to that in the US. One is the Calendar, eight of the eleven national holidays are religious. The state supports the churches, both Catholic and Protestant, through a voluntary tax, and religious education is part of the public school curriculum. Also, crosses are hung in public buildings in Bavaria.

In summary, Kersten and Alena said that the main cause of the secularization of Europe is modernization, but government policies can accelerate the decline of religious practice or help to sustain it. The church, whether at the denominational or congregational level, is most successful when it remains flexible and is able to dynamically respond to its members.






Women's Group
